Course Content (Edexcel)

The theme of year 12 will be, 'Communist states in the twentieth century' and will focus on the following;

- Russia, 1917–91: from Lenin to Yeltsin, and
- Mao's China, 1949–76.

Year 13 will focus on British History and American History;

- Protest, agitation and parliamentary reform in Britain, c1780–1928. (Visit to the Houses of Parliament)
- 4,000 word coursework essay on the American Civil Rights Movement.

Skills Gained

History places particular stress on the development of independent thought and analytical skills, and requires excellent communication skills, namely high levels of literacy and oral presentation. Consequently, students taking history will be expected to do a great deal of independent work and independent thinking, as well as a good deal of reading and writing. You have to present the results of research both in independent work and in the context of group discussions.

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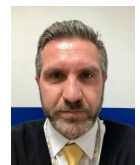
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
