Psychology is the study of mind and behaviour. Studying for A level Psychology will give you a fascinating insight into the human mind and its impact on behaviour.

You will try to answer such questions as:

'Why did the soldiers in Nazi Germany follow such terrible orders?'

'How do we create memories?'

'To what extent can we shape behaviour using rewards and punishments?'

You will also be given the opportunity to go to Shepton Mallet Prison and to the Psychology labs at The University of the West of England.

Course Content (AQA)

Year 1:

Approaches in Psychology and Research Methods - Understanding different assumptions about human behaviour and how research is collected.

Social Influence - Obedience, conformity and social change.

Memory - How memory works, why we forget and eyewitness testimony.

Attachment - Types and explanations of attachment including studies on maternal deprivation.

Psychopathology - Abnormality, phobias and OCD.

Biopsychology - The nervous system, hormones and fight and flight response.

Year 2:

Forensic Psychology - Offender profiling, explanations of crime and treatment.

Schizophrenia - Classification, explanations and treatments.

Cognition and Development - Stages of child development and A Typical development.

Analytical skills: 10% of the course content is mathematical skills. You will learn how to analyse data from research to establish whether the findings are statistically significant.
